5. FOUNDATIONAL PROGRAM

5.1. IWCF Joint Picnic 2025

The Indigenous Women and Children Foundation (IWCF) organized its Joint Annual Outing Picnic 2025 on January 24, 2025, at Bamgaijang Barak, bringing together 75 participants, including staff and children from various projects. The event featured outdoor games, team-building activities, and water-based fun, promoting joy, laughter, and stronger relationships between staff and children. The day concluded with a delightful dinner, a group photo, and a closing prayer.



5.2 IWCF Staff Orientation

The Foundation successfully conducted its 2025 Staff Orientation Programme on March 11, 2025, at the IWCF Conference Hall. The event, attended by 33 staff members, the orientation program emphasized the importance of teamwork, effective communication, and adherence to organizational policies, reiterating Foundation's commitment to upholding its values and promoting a positive work environment.



6. OBSERVATION OF SPECIAL DAYS

6.1 International Day Against Drug Abuse And Illicit Trafficking

The Buansuan Tresor Home (District De-Addiction Center) run under the Foundation organized one day awareness discussion on Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking commemorating the International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking on 26th June 2024 under the theme "United for Health and Safety". The discussion program was held among the staffs of the IWCF followed by some activities. The program was attended by a total of 34 IWCF staffs.

6.2 5th Staff Day 2024 cum 78th Independence Celebration

The Foundation successfully celebrated its 5th Staff Day 2024 and India's 78th Independence Day. The event featured various performances, award ceremonies, and speeches, including the Employee of the Year awards. The celebration was a testament to the foundation's commitment to recognizing staff dedication and nurturing the younger generation. The event concluded with a staff day dinner and a group photo session.

6.3 6th Children's Day Celebration

The Foundation celebrated the sixth Children's Day on November 14, 2024, at the Jaithau Children's Home premises, honoring Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru's birth anniversary. The event, themed "Listen to the Future," aimed to prioritize children's needs and secure their future. Shri Gauge Kamei, Manager (D), Depot Incharge, Food Corporation of India FSD, Tamenglong, graced the occasion as the Chief Guest. The celebration featured a special songs, recognition and appreciation of children, and an entertainment session by staff. The event brought together inmates from Jaithau Children's Home for Boys, Zauzian Children's Home for Girls, and Macarius Home- Specialized Adoption Agency.



7. TRAININGS/WORKSHOP ATTENDED

7.1 Awareness And Consultative Program On Land And Forest Rights

The Foundation staff attended an Awareness and Consultation Program on Forest and Land Rights at the Town Baptist Church Hall, Tamenglong, on June 29, 2024. Organized by local well-wishers, social activists, and the Zeliangrong Baptist Association, the program aimed to engage local communities in discussions on forest and land rights, focusing on the Indian Forest Act, biodiversity conservation, and indigenous peoples' rights. The program specifically addressed issues related to the Jiri Mara Sanctuary, Azuram Community Reserve, Zeilad Wildlife Sanctuary, and Bunning Wildlife Sanctuary. Resource Person Advocate Khampa Khalter and Executive Director



Dimguang Ruangmei shared their expertise on the topic, providing valuable insights to the participants.

7.2 A Webinar On Grading Of Child Care Institution (CCIs)

Three staff members from Jaithau Children Home, Zauzian Children Home, and Macarius Home, under the Indigenous Women and Children Foundation (IWCF), participated in an online webinar on the Grading of Child Care Institutions (CCIs) organized by the Central Project Monitoring Unit, Mission Vatsalya, Ministry of Women and Child Development, Government of India, on August 9, 2024. The webinar aimed to assess CCIs against the Juvenile Justice Act and Mission

Vatsalya Scheme guidelines, evaluate the quality of facilities and services provided, and ensure CCIs are managed in line with the JJ Act and Rules. The grading process encompasses various types of CCIs, including Children Homes, Specialized Adoption Agencies, Open Shelters, Observation Homes, Special Homes, and Places of Safety.

7.3 District Level Consultative Meeting For United NCOs Mission Manipur (UNMM), Partner NGOs Tamenglong & Noney Districts

A District Level Consultative Meeting for United NGOs Mission Manipur (UNMM) was held on September 23, 2024, at RNBA Conference Hall, facilitated by Dim gong Range and Anthony Panmei. The meeting aimed to restructure and rebuild UNMM, and formed two committees for Noney and Tamenglong districts. Key topics discussed included District Network Committee and District Women Committee formation, budget allocation, peace building, capacity building, and group presentations from Noney and Tamenglong districts. The meeting also covered insightful sessions on institutional building, land rights, carbon market/PES, early grants, and funding opportunities from Anaha Trusts and Dhvani Foundation.

7.4. Consultative Workshop of Law Enforcement Agencies, Service Providers And NGOs To Effectively Address Child Safety And Human Trafficking

A one-day Consultative Workshop on child safety and human trafficking was organized by Tamenglong district Police and Project Mukti on 24th September 2024 at Shekinuh Inn, Tamenglong, Manipur. The workshop aimed to effectively address child safety and human trafficking issues, featuring a keynote address by Mr. Lanmiyo Luikham MPS SP, Tamenglong district, who emphasized the need for child safety and safeguarding children from violence, exploitation, and abuse. A panel discussion followed, with a team of experts leading the conversation, including Mr. Josiah Pamei, MPS Additional SP, Tamenglong District, and representatives from the Indigenous Women and Children Foundation, who deliberated on topics



such as legal perspectives, scenario presentations, available services, field-level challenges, and success stories. The workshop concluded with the formation of a committee to address child safety and human trafficking issues, comprising members from various organizations, including the Indigenous Women and Children Foundation, District Child Protection Unit, and Juvenile Justice Board.

7.5. Permaculture Or Ecological Farming, Training Of Trainers

The Executive Director, IWCF, and Manager, Macias Home-SAA, attended the 6-day Permaculture or Ecological Farming Training of Trainers was organized by Henry Martyn Institute, Hyderabad in collaboration with Loamy Lop, Barak Dairy, BIKACHSI Agro, Tareng ASG, and Happy Ingkhol from September 27 to October 2, 2024, at Singerband Village, Cachar District, Assam. The training



aimed to equip participants with knowledge and skills on permaculture principles, farm design, biodiversity, water management, and nutrition. Expert resource persons, including Mr. Raja Ganesh, Ms. Karthiga Auroville, and Mr. Jayanta Kr. Sarma, led sessions on various topics, including permaculture principles, farm design, water management, and soil health. The training was attended by around 40-50 participants from neighboring states, including Manipur, Assam, Nagaland, and Meghalaya.

7.6. Two Days Workshop On Carbon Markets, Payment For Ecosystem Services (PES), And Nature- Based Solution For Civil Society Organization (CSOS) Of Manipur



A two-day workshop on Carbon Markets, Payment for Ecosystem Services (PES), and Nature-Based Solutions was held on October 3-4, 2024, at RNBA Office, Imphal, Manipur, for Civil Society Organisations (CSOs) of Manipur. The Executive Director, IWCF, and Manager, Macias Home-SAA, attended the training, which aimed to provide in-depth knowledge on carbon markets, PES, and nature-based solutions.

Sessions covered topics such as climate change, carbon markets, types of carbon projects, and payment for ecosystem services.

7.7. One Day State Orientation and Training Program on Adoption Regulations 2022

A one-day state orientation and training program on Adoption Regulations, 2022, was organized by the Department of Social Welfare, Manipur, in collaboration with the Central Adoption Resource Authority (CARA). The program aimed to provide in-depth understanding and capacity building on adoption regulations. Facilitators Ms. Upasana Chakma, Sr. Professional, CARA, and Ms. Annie Mangsatabam, Chief Functionary, IWCF, led the sessions.



Around 200 participants attended the program, including representatives from various child care institutions, CWC, Child Helpline, SARA, NGOs, and government officials. Representatives from IWCF who attended the training included Ms. Jengamliu Martha Gangmei, Manager, Macarius Home-SAA; Ms. Kaniamgailiu Pamei, Social Worker cum early childhood educator, Macarius Home-SAA; Mr. Gailinreiyang Mpamei, Superintendent, Jaithau Children Home; and Mr. Meidinlung Gangmei, Case Worker, Zauzian Children Home. The training concluded with a call to clear pending adoption cases in Manipur and emphasized the importance of cooperation among stakeholders.

8. COMMUNITY PROGRAM

8.1 2 day training program on sustainable farming using appropriate method

The Indigenous Women and Children Foundation (IWCF) in collaboration with Tamenglong Baptist Church conducted a 2-day training program on "Sustainable Farming Using Appropriate

Method" on 4th and 5th April 2024 at Tamenglong Baptist Church Complex. The training was facilitated by Mr. Lungaithui Malangmei and Mr. Meidinlung Gangmei.

A representative from Manipur State Rural Livelihood Mission (MSRLM) also conducted a session on Self-Help Groups (SHGs). The training program concluded with words of gratitude and benediction by Rev. Dr. RK Liangcham, Pastor Tamenglong Baptist Church. A total of 156 participants attended the training program.



8.2 Advocacy cum Consultation Meeting on Land Rights and Documentation

The Henry Martyn Institute, Hyderabad, in collaboration with Realms of Nature Based Action (RNBA) and Indigenous Women and Children Foundation (IWCF), organized a meeting on Land



Rights and Documentation on September 20th, 2024, at Chiuluan Baptist Church Conference Hall, Tamenglong District, Manipur. Over 60 participants from four villages attended the meeting, which aimed to raise awareness about land rights and documentation. The meeting concluded with feedback from participants, who expressed satisfaction with the comprehensive lectures and emphasized the need for more awareness and discussion at the grassroots level.

8.3 2 Day Exercise of Participatory Vulnerability Analysis (PVA)

The Henry Martin Institute (HMI) organized a 2-day Participatory Vulnerability Analysis (PVA) exercise on February 8-9, 2025, at Thaucham (Charinapang) Village, Tousem Block, Tamenglong District, which was conducted by the Indigenous Women and Children Foundation (IWCF). The program aimed to identify and analyze the village's resources, social context, land use patterns, and power dynamics. The exercise was attended by 45 participants, including representatives from the village authority, traditional village court, youth and women's societies, church leaders, and elders. The program revealed the need for the village to establish a clear founder/chief, a grey area that could potentially lead to future conflicts.



8.4 Empowering Women, Empowering Communities: Women Leadership and Gender Equality cum 6th Foundation Day United Women Organization Tamenglong (UWOT)

The Henry Martin Institute (HMI) organized a training workshop on "Empowering Women, Empowering Communities: Women Leadership and Gender Equality" cum 6th Foundation Day of the United Women Organisation (UWOT) on February 20-21, 2025, at Shekinuh-inn, Tamenglong headquarters. The workshop, facilitated by the Indigenous Women and Children

Foundation (IWCF), aimed to empower women and promote gender equality. Dr. Achan Mungleng, the resource person, led sessions on achieving gender equality, understanding gender issues, and leadership skills. The workshop also included activities and group discussions on leadership, collective participation, and decision-making.

8.5 International Women's Day Celebration and Nationwide Nasha Mukti Bharat Abhiyan (NMBA)

The District Administration Tamenglong celebrated International Women's Day in collaboration with Indigenous Women and Children Foundation (IWCF) and various departments and organizations, on 8th March 2025 with a rally and programme, emphasizing the need to accelerate



action towards gender equality and highlighting the role of women in fighting drug abuse. The event featured a rally from Haipou Jadonang Park to Apollo Ground, followed by keynote messages from distinguished panellists - Dr. Majachungliu, CMO, Tamenglong, Mrs. Hearty Samro Panmei, Junior Engineer, PHE Tamenglong Division, and Mrs. Ramning Pame, Former ADC, Tamenglong - at the Multi-purpose Hall. The programme was attended by officials, students, and public leaders, and marked an important step towards promoting gender equality and

empowering women in the region.

8.6 Construction Of Vermi Compose Pit

The Indigenous Women and Children Foundation (IWCF) successfully constructed five Vermi Compost Pits during the reporting period, with support from the Henry Martin Institute, Hyderabad. Vermi Composting is a natural, eco-friendly process that utilizes earthworms to break down organic waste into a nutrient-rich compost. This initiative aims to promote sustainable agricultural practices and support local farmers by providing them with an alternative, cost-effective, and environmentally friendly method of fertilizing their crops. The Vermi Compost Pits will enable farmers to produce high-quality compost, reducing their reliance on chemical fertilizers and enhancing soil fertility. By adopting this approach, farmers can improve crop yields, reduce soil erosion, and contribute to a healthier environment. Through this project, IWCF demonstrates its commitment to empowering rural communities and promoting environmentally sustainable practices, ultimately benefiting the livelihoods of local farmers and their families.



8.7 One Day Panel Discussion on Understanding Juvenile Justice System

The Indigenous Women and Children Foundation organized a one-day panel discussion on Understanding Juvenile Justice System in collaboration with the District Child Protection Unit and Mount Gibeon School, Tamenglong. The program aimed to raise awareness about the juvenile justice system, child rights, and protective measures. Key topics discussed included the Juvenile

Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act, 2015, Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act, 2012, Prohibition of Child Marriage Act, 2006, Immoral Traffic (Prevention) Act, 1956, and Child Labour (Prohibition and Regulation) Act, 1986. The panelists highlighted important aspects



such as children's rights, consequences of child marriage, trafficking, and child labor. The discussion also touched on the need for an Observation Home in Tamenglong district, with the chief guest assuring to follow up on the matter. The program concluded with a resolve to work towards protecting child rights

9. PROJECTS ACTIVITIES

9.1 ZAUZIAN CHILDREN HOME

The Zauzian Children Home, established in 2010 by the Indigenous Women and Children Foundation (IWCF) in Tamenglong, was founded to provide care and protection to juvenile (girls) in need. It began with 14 children, mostly rescued and repatriated from mainland India by the Child Welfare Committee, Government of Manipur, in collaboration with IWCF Tamenglong, and some from local areas requiring care and protection. Since then, it has grown to accommodate 50 children, offering education, healthcare, and vocational training. The home prioritizes health through regular medical check-ups and health orientations, and encourages co-curricular activities. Notably, the home has received awards for its outstanding contributions, including the National Dedication Day celebration award in 2012 and 2013, and an award on the 227th Birth Anniversary celebration of Maharaja Nara Singh in 2019.

During the financial year 2024-2025, the home received 20 new admissions and restored 15 inmates with an average occupancy of 50-51 inmates throughout the year.

OBSERVATION OF SPECIAL DAYS

Zauzian Children Home actively participates in national and social events, allowing children to acquire knowledge, showcase their talents, and develop a sense of national pride and social responsibility. Through these events, children engage in activities like singing, dancing, and

speech, promoting their confidence and abilities. The following are the special days observed by ZCH throughout the year:

Zauzian Children Home also conducts various co-curricular activities to engage children in discipline, capacity building, and skill development. Some of the programs include:

Time Table and Math Formulae Competition, Cooking Competition, Career Counseling, Annual Sports Day, Display Board Competition, Har Ghar Tiranga, Parents/Guardian and Staff Meeting, Social Justice Day, International Zero Tolerance Day, and One Month Vocational Training from 17th March to 17th April 2025.

The Zauzian Children Home regularly receives inspections from DCPU Teams and the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) of Tamenglong, ensuring the well-being of its residents. Additionally, the home is frequently visited by various guests who engage with the children, often bringing gifts and donations to support their care. Zauzian Children Home has been a beacon of hope for girls in need, providing a nurturing environment that fosters academic excellence, creativity, and social responsibility. With its commitment to holistic development, the home has enabled children to grow and thrive, achieving notable successes in various fields. As it continues to receive support from DCPU Teams, CWC, and well-wishers, Zauzian Children Home remains dedicated to empowering its residents to reach their full potential.

9.2 JAITHAU CHILDREN HOME

Jaithau Children Home (boys), established in 2015, is run by the Indigenous Women and Children Foundation, a non-profit NGO in Tamenglong, funded by the Social Welfare Department of Manipur under the Mission Vatsalaya Scheme. With a capacity for 50 children and a staff of 15, the home provides a range of services, including study assistance by an educator, vocational training, counseling, medical care, nutritious meals planned by a dietician, and recreational activities, all designed to support the holistic development of children in need of care and protection.



During the financial year 2024-2025, the home received 15 new admissions and restored 18 inmates with an average occupancy of 50-51 inmates throughout the year.

These activities include Spelling Bee Competition, Essay Competition, Story Telling Competition, Mathematics Olympiad, Games and Sports, Annual Sports Meet, and one month Vocational Training in Blacksmithing. By engaging in these activities, children enhance their physical, emotional, and cognitive growth.

Jaithau Children Home has made significant strides in providing a nurturing environment for children in need of care and protection. Through its range of services, observance of special days, and co-curricular activities, the home has fostered holistic development, creativity, and social responsibility among its residents. With a strong foundation and dedicated staff, Jaithau Children Home continues to empower children to reach their full potential and build a brighter future.

9.3 MACARIUS HOME- SPECIALIZED ADOPTION AGENCY

Macarius Home-Specialized Adoption Agency (SAA) was initiated in 2017 by Indigenous Women and Children Foundation (IWCF) in Tamenglong, Manipur. It provides adoption and placement services for children aged 0-6 who are orphaned, abandoned, or surrendered by parents/guardians. Functioning under Central Adoption Resource Authority (CARA), it is sponsored by the Social Welfare Department, Government of Manipur under Mission Vatsalya, and has cared for 39 children since inception.

As of the financial year 2024-2025, Macarius Home-Specialized Adoption Agency reported an initial inmate count of 7. During the year, 8 new admissions were received, 3 inmates were transferred to Child Care Institutions, and 2 were restored back to their families/relatives. As of the year-end, the agency had 9 inmates in its care.

Macarius Home-Specialized Adoption Agency promotes legal adoption for orphaned, abandoned, and surrendered children. The goal is to protect their rights, provide love and care, and find them a permanent home. The agency strives to encourage positive attitudes towards adoption and dispel associated misconceptions. Despite challenges, the MH-SAA achieved its targets with the support of CARA, SARA, District Administration, SJPU, CWC, DCPU and IWCF.



9.4 DIGNITAS HOME (SENIOR CITIZEN HOME)

Dignitas Home (Old Age Home), an initiative of Indigenous Women and Children Foundation (IWCF), was established in the year 2022 with the primary objective of providing care, protection,

and shelter to elderly individuals in need. Since its inception, the home has been functioning actively, catering to the physical, emotional, and social needs of its residents.

ACTIVITIES AND SERVICES:

Dignitas Home offers comprehensive services, including:



1. 24/7 Care and Support: Trained staff provide personalized attention and assistance.
2. Nutrition and Meals: Nutritious meals and refreshments are prepared in-house.
3. Medical Care: Regular medical checks and access to external services are available.
4. Recreational Activities: Games, arts, and celebrations promote social interaction and mental stimulation.

CHALLENGES AND FUTURE PLANS

Despite smooth operations, Dignitas Home faces challenges like limited resources and funding. To overcome these, IWCF plans to:

1. Seek Additional Funding: Enhance infrastructure, services, and programs.
2. Secure Resources: Support the home's continued success.

Dignitas Home has been providing a safe and supportive environment for elderly individuals in need since its establishment in 2022. With its dedicated staff and range of services, the home has been making a positive impact on the lives of its residents. IWCF remains committed to supporting and enhancing the home's services, ensuring that it continues to provide care, protection, and shelter to those who need it most.



9.5 BUANSUAN TRESOR HOME (District De-Addiction Centre)

The District De-Addiction Centre (DDAC) has 15 bedded facilities and allows the client to stay for a period of 30 days (or 60 days for some exceptional cases) may generally be required for a substance abuser to undergo various phases of detoxification and psychological therapy, a provision for extension of stay was made for a maximum period of another month in deserving cases. Both medical and psychological services are provided on an in-patient basis. Medical care is provided by nurses in consult with the doctors. Psychological care is provided by counselor and social worker.

ADMISSION STATISTICS (2024-25)

During the financial year 2024-25, our center admitted a total of 42 clients. The breakdown of admissions reveals that:

1. Drug Addiction: 13 patients (31%) were admitted for treatment of drug addiction, as assessed through the Drug Addiction Screening Test (DAST).
2. Alcoholism: 29 patients (69%) were admitted for treatment of alcoholism, as evaluated through the Short Michigan Alcoholism Screening Test (SMAST).

Buansuan Tresor Home (BTH) is committed to continuing our crucial work in supporting individuals on their journey to overcome addiction. We remain dedicated to empowering those in our care and facilitating their successful reintegration into society.

9.6 Grace Tribal Hostel

Grace Tribal Hostel continues to serve the tribal children who come from far off remote villages to Tamenglong Headquarter for education purposes. The Hostel is located at the Heart of the Tamenglong Town where educational Institutions are around located near-by. The Hostel has facilitated 60 students this year. These students are mostly no other alternative means to stay in Town. By offering basic yet functional accommodations at a fraction of the cost of traditional hotels, hostels enable guests to allocate more of their resources to experiences rather than lodging expenses. Living in a hostel can make you self-reliant and prepare you for the future life. It is a place of fun, extended family, and a lifetime of memories. Most importantly, hostel life prepares you with practical skills, highly sought after skills in contemporary workplaces and business management.
