MANAB KALYAN provided relief in the flood-affected areas of Patharighat revenue circle under Sipajhar Block in Darrang district. These areas are among the lowest-lying parts of the district, with a large population depending on daily wages, fish farming, and small-scale farming for their livelihood. Paddy farmers lost their entire crops due to the floods, while fish farmers faced huge losses as their fisheries were washed away by the floodwaters. Daily wage earners, mostly agricultural laborers, have been unable to find work until the situation improves. With the approved support; MANAB KALYAN distributed relief to 1,480 households in the affected locations .

In the aftermath of the devastating floods, the community faced a significant increase in health-related challenges, including waterborne and vector-borne diseases. Recognizing the urgent need for medical intervention, we joined hands with our partner organization, Jeevan Shiksha, to organize four free health check-up camps. These camps were strategically conducted in the most affected areas to ensure accessibility for those in need.

Each camp was equipped with qualified medical professionals who provided comprehensive health check-ups, consultations, and immediate care to the villagers. Additionally, essential medicines were distributed free of cost to those diagnosed with ailments, ensuring timely treatment and reducing the financial burden on affected families. Preventive measures and health awareness sessions were also conducted to educate the community on maintaining hygiene and preventing disease outbreaks in flood-affected conditions.

The initiative directly benefited over 1,000 villagers, offering them much-needed relief during a critical time. It was heartening to see the positive impact of this effort, as it not only provided medical support but also reassured the community of the collective strength and resilience that comes from partnerships and solidarity.



This collaborative effort with Jeevan Shiksha showcased the importance of timely action and community-driven healthcare interventions in mitigating the effects of natural disasters. It stands as a testament to our commitment to the well-being of the community during times of crisis.



We, MANAB KALYAN, conducted meetings to discuss the roles and responsibilities of Panchayat members in the VHSNC committee. During these meetings, it was revealed that the secretary of each VHSNC committee (ASHA) often obtains the president's (Panchayat member's) signature to withdraw money from the bank. However, it was noted that no formal meetings of the VHSNC are being convened.

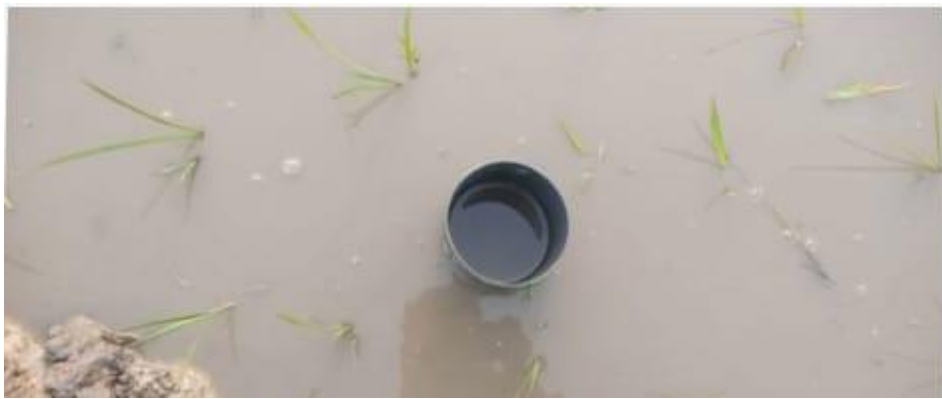


Introducing AWD in three district

AWD stands for Alternate Wetting and Drying, a water management technique that Kosher Climate India Private Limited (Kosher Climate) has used in projects to reduce methane emissions and conserve water:

- **How it works:** AWD involves periodically drying out fields to introduce oxygen into the soil, which discourages the growth of microbes that produce methane.
- **Benefits:** AWD can reduce water usage by 30–40% without compromising crop yield.

AWD is a process of saving water in irrigated paddy fields. It is a process where the field is flooded for some days and then dries for some days. The dry period may vary from 1 to more than 10 days depending on the type of soil and variety. Besides saving irrigation requirement in paddy, it also helps in mitigating GHGs emission from paddy fields.



Volunteers from our team will go door to door to collect data from legal farmers for registration. Farmers need to submit photocopies of their Aadhaar card, landholding documents, and phone numbers. After registration, pipes will be installed in each farmer's paddy field within five to six days of transplantation. Twenty-one days after transplantation, volunteers will advise farmers to let their paddy fields dry for three to four days, maintaining zero water levels. After this dry period, farmers can water their fields up to 3–4 cm. During this time, volunteers will take two photos—one showing the pipe and the other showing the drying field with the pipe. Similarly, 45 days after transplantation, volunteers will repeat this process, guiding farmers to dry their fields for three to four days before re-watering them, and taking the same set of photos for documentation.
