1. Child Development Programme

1.1 Study Materials Distribution:

The Real Charitable Trust has been taken initiative to provide educational support through supplementary education centres with value education and special care to deprived students in slums. The main objective of the supplementary education centre is to create awareness on the need of education for poor students. Through this supplementary centre, the slum children were provided the opportunity to equip themselves with leadership qualities, communication and soft skills. The supplementary education centre ensures active participation of the students in rallies and campaigns for social causes.



1.2 Nutrition support to Supplementary Education children:

This report outlines the nutrition support provided to children by Real Charitable trust to address malnutrition and promote healthy development. The initiative aimed to ensure that children have access to nutritious food and essential nutrients critical for their growth and well-being. The primary objective of the nutrition support program for children was to combat malnutrition and its associated health consequences. By providing targeted nutrition interventions, the initiative aimed to improve the nutritional status of children and promote healthy growth and development. Distributed fortified foods, micronutrient powders, and dietary supplements to children identified as malnourished or at risk of malnutrition. These supplements provided essential nutrients critical for growth and development.



Promoting hygiene and sanitation practices to prevent illness and improve nutritional outcomes among children. This included initiatives such as handwashing promotion, clean water provision, and sanitation facilities improvement. The nutrition support provided to children by Real Charitable trust has made a significant impact on improving the health and well-being of children in the community. By addressing malnutrition and promoting healthy eating habits, the initiative has set a foundation for a brighter future for the next generation. Continued efforts and investment in nutrition support programs for children are essential to ensure that every child has the opportunity to thrive and reach their full potential.

2. Youth Development

2.1. STeP Program- GDA (General Duty Assistant) Course:

The youth comprise over one-third of the Indian population, which in turn constitutes a major part of the labour force of the country. A country like India which has a huge young population can reap better benefits from the demographic dividend if its youth are better skilled and employable. It is crucial for the energy of the underprivileged youth to be channelized properly with proper direction to aid economic growth and nation building. Real Charitable Trust implemented STeP “Smile Twin e-Learning Programme” centre and GDA (General Duty Assistant) Course had been conducted with the support of Smile foundation. This livelihood programme aims to impart employability skills to youth from marginalised communities help them to attain a basic quality of life and work towards a dignified future. The marginalized community youth around 250 identified from Debar Nagar, MGR Nagar, RR Nagar, Damodaran ,kodungaiyur and KKD Nagar by the survey and distributing pamphlets. As per survey it was short-listed according to the criteria. The course started with 40 students in the first batch with shift base morning and evening and trained by the trainer to create a good impact on GDA course including an internship in a nearby hospital for practical training. During the internship, students learned about the hospital environment and how to deal with patients. The Real Trust particularly concentrated and realized the importance of Job placement for the students. From the first batch, 90% were placed in reputed hospitals for jobs and ensured the income source by the Real Trust. The STeP “Smile Twin e-Learning Programme” centre and GDA (General Duty Assistant) Course was organized and conducted by Mrs Kavitha instructor and Mr. Anbarasan centre coordinator cum core employability trainer with headed and guidance of Dr. Lawrence director of Real Trust.

(I). Curriculum and Syllabus:

- Students have their subject syllabus in Wadhvani opportunity platform, and they can learn easily by seeing visually of subjects.
- Students can access easily the Wadhvani opportunity platform for learning purpose and can access anywhere and anytime.
- Students and faculties are having proper syllabus and activity sheets.

(II). Teaching Methods and Strategies:

- faculties are well experienced in GDA and Core Employability courses.
- Wadhvani opportunity platform has Faculty's syllabus for the course, as per the syllabus they were teaching and conducted the activities.
- Usually, faculty used to take a session in video clipping method through the projector screen. They teach them to understand the subject as easy way.
- After training we sent them to internship in various hospitals to learn hospital structure and environment.

(III). Student Engagement:

- Students are very well interested to participated the class room activity, community activity, and online activity.
- Students are involved in the community program such as Madras day, homeless people day, Women's Day etc.....

(IV). Assessment and Evaluation:

- We conducted assessment for the students in each batch, we used online platform of Wadhvani opportunity to conduct the quizzes assessment in General Duty Assistance and employability of skill training, they have 3 formative Assessment and 1 final summative Assessment in these 2 courses.
- In each assessment students should get above 70% marks.
- If students get Below 70%, they have one more opportunity to do the assessment. Each assessment has 2 opportunities to attend.

(V). Outcomes and Achievements:

- After course completion we made job opportunity in hospitals and homecare health sectors.

- Each term we had 80% of placement, and students have good job. because of this course they can survive by own leg.

The Nursing Assistant Course was jointly organized and inaugurated by the Real charitable Trust with supported by Smile Foundation at Bose street, Krishnamurthy Nagar. The program was



inaugurated by Mr. Tamilvanan Assistant Commissioner of Police Puliyanthope jurisdiction by lighting the kuthu villakku preside over by Mr. Nirmal kumar Chief Community Development officer, Tamilnadu Urban Development Habitat, Ms. Sasi Advocate Madras High Court and Mr. Karunanithi Director Manitham foundation Headed by Dr. S. Lawrence Director Real Trust. The three-month short-term training course was conducted at the Real Trust training centre on the basis of how poor women who are unemployed after 10th grade can rise to life with confidence. In this course, first aid, home-level patient care, procedures emergency medical treatment methods, and core employability training trainers

were specially trained. They were also given direct experience training at hospitals of Pavithra Hospital. The Multi speciality, Murthuzaviya Charitable Hospital, RS Hospital, We are thrilled to finally have the opportunity to work with 18 people at the famous Apollo Hospital and others at nearby medical service centers. . The training program was led by coaches including Ms. Mary Hilda, Mr. Anbarasan. The second phase of the training, which was conducted under the guidance of Mr. Lawrence, Director of the Real Trust.

Also, he explained the support of CWDR and activities. After the orientation of the director, the awareness training was handled by resource person Mrs. Denoja who made aware that Adolescent women's right to sexual reproductive health is a human right. The special invitees Mr. Tamilvanan Assistant commissioner of police, Mr. Nirmal Kumar, Chief development officer Tamil Nadu urban development board.



3.1. Shelter Home for Urban Homeless (Men)-Madhavaram

RCT runs three Shelter Home for Urban Homeless for men namely Madavaram, KG hospital and Keelkattalai.

3.1.2. Night Survey / Street Engagement:

Real Charitable Trust conducted night Survey with support of Greater Chennai Corporation

Night survey is the key to identify the homeless people and it provides a chance to help the needy. We had done more than 32-night survey or street engagement. We had come across more than 200 homeless interacting individually and referred them to the suitable shelter and more than 22 were admitted in beneficiaries. Following are the major results or outcomes of the social night survey referred them to the suitable shelter and more than 22 were admitted in our shelter as beneficiaries. Following are the major results or outcomes of the social night surveys Identifying the areas with concentration of homeless population and number of homeless in each area

- Conducting survey to identify individual profile Homeless people
- Getting consent from the Homeless people
- Finding the interest or willingness of homeless to have a shelter for them in their premises
- Identifying the aspirations of the homeless for a shelter and also the deterrents preventing the homeless from using the existing shelters, if any

- Broadly identifying the possible buildings and locations where new shelters can be built and duly display on the map by geo tagging the

Homelessness is a huge problem in India. And there is no fast and easy fix. We must treat the root issues that have caused the persons to become homeless and gradually integrate them back into society. Supporting their growth and stability is a great first step. Real Trust had come across many critical rescue processes and referral cases. While doing night survey and street engagement we rescue the needy and support them to provide shelter at home, if they are in other categories they would be rescued and referred into the concerned shelter. We also referred many residents to our neighbouring shelters. The process of rescue and referral was satisfying activities among mentioned all other activities.



3.1.3. Counselling Process/ Collecting Data from residents:



Counselling is a professional relationship that empowers diverse individuals, families and groups to accomplish mental health, wellness, education and career goals. In counselling just hear their problems and issues and help them in their need of physiological relief. Periodically and in case need the regular counselling will be given to all the residents based on their issues at our shelter in Madavaram milk colony. Through counselling Real Charitable Trust set up goals/target to motivate the clients to achieve the given goals/targets. Based on counselling we prepare social individual case study and case history. The frequent counselling helped us to retain the residents and as the result we could ling them with job and few were reintegrated and referred to the other shelter.

3.1.4. Training on Entrepreneurship Skill Training and Alcohol De-Addiction:

Skill based learning focuses on increasing employability through series of inputs to: Equip residents with appropriate hands-on skills which help them to be job- ready. Core focus on job role based skills leads to comprehensive specialization, thereby increasing efficacy of the residents.

3.1.5. Skill Training (Photo Frame Making):

Photo frame is a decorative edging for a photograph intended to enhance it making it easier to display or protect it. Handmade photo frames act as a great way to add creativity to our memorabilia

On 13th June 2023, some of our residents in NULM-SUH (Men), Real Charitable Trust, at Moolasathiram Main Road, Chennai were given training to the basic principles of framing. It was aimed at complete novices in framing, as well as those who have made some attempts to frame their own work. There is no need for any experience of using hand tools.

We had taken through the core skills involved in making a frame to suit a piece of work for our residents. The below mentioned were trained in detail:

The key elements of a framed picture – what each bit does;

- how to cut a mount using specialized cutters;
- the correct methods for attaching a picture to the mount;
- cutting moulding and joining sections to create a frame for the mounted picture;
- finding out about simple options for adding a finish to the frame; how to cut glass and backing board to fit the frame and finally assembling the framed picture, ready for hanging.



3.1.6. Alcohol De-Addiction Workshop:

Alcohol and drugs are consumed by many around us to have fun, as a remedy for emotional & stressful problems, to be part of a group, to feel good, to feel happy and for much more reasons without knowing that every 20 out of these 100 become dependent on it. Addiction can happen to anybody there is no specific sex,

occupation, family background, education that has exception but when there is addiction it surely needs specialized therapy for recovery. There are many people who consider use of alcohol for recreational or on social occasions as normal and acceptable, but little is their awareness that even this carries risk of road traffic injuries, socially inappropriate or embarrassing behaviour. Real Charitable Trust provides adequate workshop on how to overcome from such alcohol addiction, the inmates of NULM-SUH have been involved in such alcohol de-addiction workshop frequently



at our shelter, in Madhavaram, Chennai.

3. 1.7. Re-Integration:

The Re-Integration Program is a resident centric methodology for the reintegration of homeless people back into society, that assists and measures client progress on 3 criteria; lifestyle, accommodation and employment. So far it is showing promising results with residents displaying the lifestyles changes that will enable them cope in the society.

Factors associated with successful Reintegration:

- A personal change mechanism - often some sort of personal crises for the resident triggers the motivation and more importantly the determination for behavioral change and action¹²
- Advocacy - the homeless residents need an advocate to assist them navigate services like social grants, ID application and health care



- Parenting – from resident workers and interventions residents learn the skills and attitudes most often associated with good parenting e.g. personal hygiene, basic life and interpersonal skills, saving and how to treat members of the opposite sex

3.1.8. Medical Camp:

Corporation Health departments has provided a doctor and a pharmacist staff to conduct the regular health camp on monthly basis. This service is being provided by corporation under the health care support. Probably the people used go to the doctor for their health but through this regular medical camp doctor and other official visit the shelter and provide medical care by examining the residents and provide good medicine and good advice for their good health. Apart from doctors and pharmacist, the Sanitary Officer, The Sanitary 1Inspector, assistants of sanitary inspectors, few often the Assistant Health Officer would joint in it.

NULM-Shelter for Urban Homeless of Real Charitable Trust had organized 08 medical camps on monthly basis at Moolasathiram Main Road, Madavaram, Chennai-51. Usually, the medical camp would start around 9:30am and would end up around 11.30Am. All residents were registered and provided health card on regular basis where their details and follow up are being recorded by the doctor. They are being examined by the doctor and they were given necessary health tips and counselling to prevent themselves from the sickness and keep themselves healthy, finally the required inmates are prescribed with the right medicine regularly. The pharmacists once again insist the resident to take the drugs as per the doctor's advice before distributing the medicines.

The medicines provided by the corporation for free of cost, mainly they were Paracetamol, Gelusil, Avil, B-Complex vitamin, Calcium supplement, Septran, Diclofenac and Mebex. Regularly most of the Resident of shelter was benefited through this camp. Refreshments like Tea and biscuits were provided to the residents at the end of the medical camp.



3.1.9. SMC (Shelter Management Committee) Meeting:

A shelter management committee comprising three permanent shelter staff and four members elected/selected by residents of the shelters would be constituted on requirement basis. The committee would oversee the daily management, upkeep, and cleanliness of the shelter, as well as develop programmes and guidelines for reintegration, discipline and improvement. Real Charitable Organized 08 SMC Meeting for this financial year accordingly once per month. The committee meetings were being organized including Doctor, Health Officers, Sanitary Officers and other ULBs of corporation. This committee meeting would discuss past work and future plan, health and hygiene, food, infrastructure, maintenance, inductions of new residents and discipline.



3.1.10. Mass Cleaning:

On monthly basis the mass cleanings are done at the shelter with the support of the residents. Few times as per the need and in special occasions the mass cleaning process are done. We do have a house keeping person who does on daily basis cleaning to make sure the shelter is clean and hygiene.

3.1.11. Cultural Awareness Yatra:

- To Educate the people importance of shelter activities
- To mobilize urban homeless through folk media
- Try to create awareness to the public to support the Homeless people,
- Make people to support their own family and not to make any homeless by letting them ignorant, unwanted and unloved.



3.1.12. Officials Visit/ Inspection:

The shelter for urban homeless men had been implementing since 2016 by real trust and offered services such as food, accommodation, and rehabilitation like reintegration with family and job linkage with Support of Chennai Corporation. So for three decade crossed in this shelter home service on social auditing visit made by the external team. The team verified all the documents which maintain in the shelter and suggestion were given to improve in the registers. They also suggested visiting the room, and restroom, kitchen and library to maintain health and hygiene atmosphere. The care taker insisted to watch the resident routine job that they used to practice in personal clean by washing their blanket pillow cover and make it to practice. Frequently social audits are done by city coordinators of Greater Chennai Corporation and of Zone 3 of Greater Chennai. Yearly once we are being examined by external audit.

3.1.13. Death Report:

Heart breaking to share that one of the residents Mr. Ashok expired on 24-8-2023 as he took bath in the time of morning, he was aged about 73. One of the residents informed to coordinator and director regarding this sorrowful incident, and the team of Real Trust took initiate to identify



his family members immediately. With help of documents maintained through regular counselling, the family members of Ashok had been identified and brought to shelter home. We also informed to ULBs of Chennai Corporation (shelter home) about his loss and the process had taken to hand over the body to the family. Real Charitable Trust handed over the body followed by common prayer for his sole to be rest in peace. The family members express their gratitude for providing accommodation and food and other service to this person and also other residents such as homeless people and survival on street due to many problems.

3.1.14. Madras Day Celebration: A small group of people who love this city launched a unique celebration in 2004. The founding day of Madras is considered to be August 22, 1639. It was on that day, in that year, that a



sliver of land, where Fort. St. George stands today, was transacted by the East India Company.

The deal was struck by Francis Day, his 'dubash' Beri Thimmappa, and their superior, Andrew Cogan, with the local Nayak rulers. It is believed that this deal was made on August 22, 1639. Out of the fort, grew settlements. Then the villages around it were brought together. And

then, the old and new towns linked up. And then we had the city.

Today, Chennai stands tall for a variety of reasons. Education, healthcare, IT, history, tourism, auto industries, movies, etc. And yes, it also has its warts. As per instruction and Guidance of the GCC, Madras Day was



celebrated in our shelter by conducting various competitions such as drawing competitions, poetry, and

singing among residents and to the public. The program was headed by Dr. S. Lawrence and presided over by the Sub inspector of police M2 police station, Madavaram, participated as a chief guest and distributed the prizes and certificate to the winners. The "Real Trust GDA" course student create an Exhibition on Madras in creative manner and it was inaugurated by the special invitees. Program was planned and organizes by the shelter home staff and GDA course students were participated and conducted the cultural events End of the program sweets was distributed to the participants, followed by the national anthem.



3.1.15. Independence Day: Independence Day on August 15th is celebrated every year across the nation. The moment will not only be celebrated in governmental offices, but also in non-governmental organization, industries, institutions, schools and colleges as well. The National Day is followed since 1947. This time it

is 76th year of celebration. Shelter for Men under NULM-SUH (National Urban Livelihood Mission-Shelter for Urban Homeless), Real Charitable Trust had a small celebration on Independence Day on 15th August 2023. Flag hoisting ceremonies took place and followed by a talk on independence and freedom fighters were delivered by the director of Real Charitable Trust. This small event was arranged by our residents along with few neighbours at The Shelter Home for Urban Homeless (Men), Moolasathiram Main Road, Madavaram, Chennai - 51, the flag was hoisted and sweets were distributed.

In counseling just hear their problems and issues and help them in their need of physiological relief. Periodically and in case need the regular counseling will be given to all the residents based on their issues at our shelter in Keelkattalai. Through counseling Real Charitable Trust set up goals/target to motivate the clients to achieve the given goals/targets. Based on counseling we prepare social individual case study and case history. The frequent counseling helped us to retain the residents and as the result we could ling them with job and few were reintegrated and referred to the other shelter.



3.2.4. Re-Integration:

The Re-Integration Program is a resident centric methodology for the reintegration of homeless people back into society, that assists and measures client progress on 3 criteria; lifestyle, accommodation and employment. So far it is

showing promising results with residents displaying the lifestyles changes that will enable them cope in the society.

Factors associated with successful Reintegration: -

- A personal change mechanism - often some sort of personal crises for the resident triggers and more importantly the determination for

the motivation behavioral change and action

- Advocacy - the homeless residents need an advocate to assist them navigate services like social grants, ID application and health care
- Parenting – from resident workers and interventions residents learn the skills and attitudes most often associated with good parenting e.g. personal hygiene, basic life and interpersonal skills,

3.2.4. Chairman of Tambaram City Municipal Corporation Zone-2 inspected the shelter along with officials:

Chairman of Zone-2, Commissioner SO, and SI officials of the Tambaram City Municipal Corporation, including other officials are, visited our shelter to assess the facilities and interact with the residents. The visit aimed to evaluate the condition of the shelter facilities, understand the needs and concerns of the residents, and explore opportunities for collaboration between the municipal corporation and the Real Charitable Trust. During the visit, the following topics were discussed:

3.2.6. SMC (Shelter Management Committee) Meeting:

A Shelter Management Committee comprising three permanent shelter staff, 6 members of elected/selected by residents of the shelter home and Officials like Doctor, SO, SI & Police personal/ other ULBs of corporation would be constituted in SMC on requirement/ available basis. Monthly once the SMC meetings were carried out in the shelter home. In the meeting monthly activities, needs of Residents/Shelter was discussed. The Shelter Management Committee formed in the Shelter by comprising of permanent Shelter Staff and 6 Elected/selected residents of shelter home, the committee would oversee the daily management, upkeep and Cleanliness of the shelter, as well as develop programs and guidelines for reintegration, discipline and improvement. This committee meeting would discuss past work and future plan, health and hygiene, food, infrastructure, maintenance, inductions of new residents and discipline.



3.2.7. Official Visit/ Inspection

The officials from Tambaram city municipal corporation team verified all the documents which maintain in the shelter and constructive feedback were given to the improvement of the registers and shelter. They also suggested by visiting the living room of residents, restrooms, kitchen to

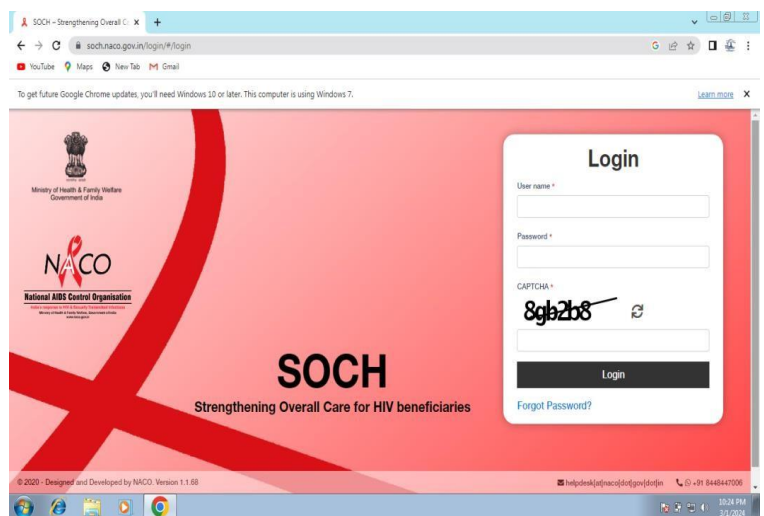

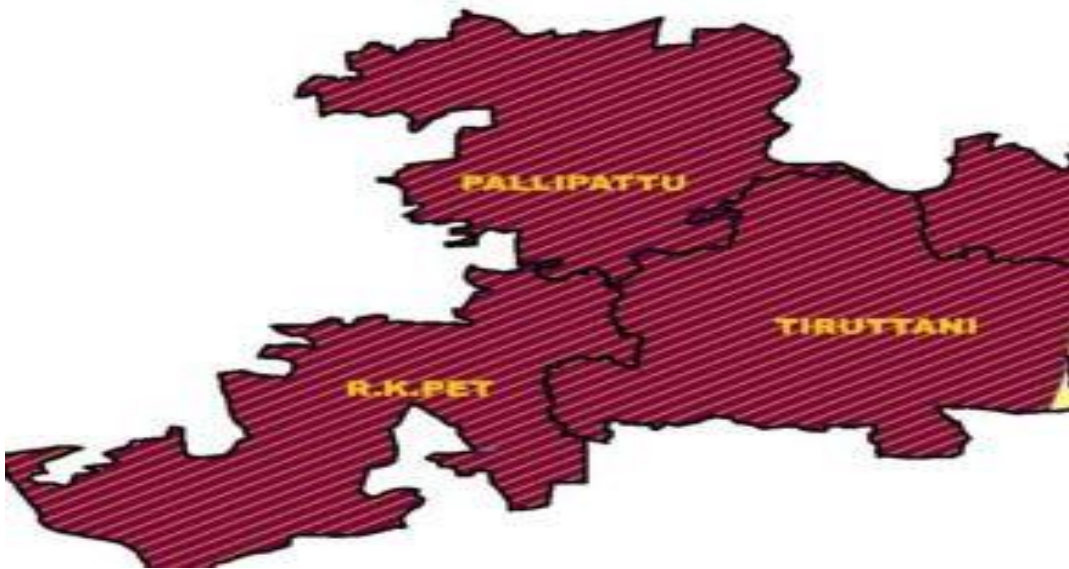
4.3. TI Intervention in Tiruvallur

Tamil Nadu State AIDS project cell was formed in 1993. In 1994, it was registered as a Society under the societies act as Tamil Nadu state AIDS Control society (TANSACS), the first of its kind for the nation. The State Health secretary is the President of the society and IAS officer is the Member Secretary and Project Director of the society. TANSACS fully funded by the National AIDS Control organization (NACO) which is a division of the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare of the Central Government of India. The Programs of TANSACS are governed by the guidelines of National AIDS Control Program (NACP), which is in its fifth phase. At the district level the programs and oversight to the interventions are provided by the District AIDS Prevention Control units (DAPCU). TANSACS select and given the project to NGO's, our REAL CHARITABLE TRUST got the project on 01/05/2020. TANSACS Given Target 1200 (FSW-900, MSM-250, TG-50).

In 2017, an estimated 1.6% of female sex workers in India were living with HIV, although this figure varies between states. For example, prevalence among female sex workers is estimated at 7.4% in Maharashtra and 6.3% in Andhra Pradesh.

Although sex work is not legal in India, associated activities such as running a brothel are. This means police are often hostile towards sex workers and authorities justify routine brothel raids. The implications of this are far reaching. For example, a study in Andhra Pradesh indicated a significant association between police abuse and increased risk of HIV transmission and inconsistent condom use.

Stigma and discrimination against sex workers is common and restricts their access to healthcare. For example, a study in north Karnataka found 90% of female sex workers had witnessed stigma against HIV positive sex workers, while high proportions said fear of verbal abuse, neglect and isolation would prevent them from disclosing an HIV positive status to anyone.

Sex workers are one of the high-risk groups targeted by India's National AIDS Control Organisation (NACO), which programmes successful peer-to-peer HIV interventions (when individuals from key affected populations provide services to their peers or link them to services within healthcare settings). In 2018, NACO reported reaching 84% of sex workers in rural areas in around 100 districts with peer-led HIV prevention, testing and treatment.

In 2017, data reported to UNAIDS suggests around 67% of HIV positive sex workers were aware of their status and 91% of sex workers (HIV positive and negative) reported using condoms.

MEN WHO HAVE SEX WITH MEN (MSM)

Around 2.7% of men who have sex with men (MSM) in India are living with HIV, of whom around 65% are aware of their status.

HIV prevalence varies greatly between areas. For example, around 10% of MSM in Andhra Pradesh and 5% in Maharashtra are estimated to be living with HIV.

A 2015 study of men who have sex with men, conducted across 12 Indian cities, found 7% tested HIV positive. Just under a third (30%) of those who reported having anal or oral sex

with a man in the past 12 months were married to a woman and engaging in heterosexual sex. The study also found evidence of emerging epidemics among men who have sex with men in urban areas not previously recognized as having high HIV burdens.

In September 2018, India's Supreme Court decriminalized homosexuality between consenting adults. The decision overturned a ruling made by the Supreme Court in 2013 that reinstated Section 377, a British pre-colonial era law that carried a maximum jail sentence of 10 years, resulting in HIV services being out of reach for many MSM.

Despite changes to the legal environment, men who have sex with men in India remain extremely marginalized and face widespread stigma, homophobia and discrimination, all of which prevent them from accessing HIV services and can make them more vulnerable to acquiring HIV.

TRANSGENDER

HIV prevalence among [transgender people](#) in India was estimated to be 3.1% in 2017, the second highest prevalence among all key populations in the country. Around 68% of transgender people living with HIV are aware of their status.

In India, being a hijra (known as 'aravani', 'aruvani' or 'jagappa' in some areas) is an identity associated with being a transgender woman, intersex or a eunuch. However, not all transgender women in India belong to a hijra community. The traditional background of hijras is linked to high-risk behaviours, such as alcohol and substance abuse, and low literacy rates.

In April 2014, the Indian Supreme Court recognised transgender people as a distinct gender. Since then, health and welfare programmes to meet this group's specific needs have been set up. In 2017, NACO reported that around 45% of transgender people and hijras were receiving targeted HIV interventions. In the same year, around 80% of transgender people surveyed reported using a condom.

Despite the change in law, transgender people face pervasive stigma and violence, linked not only to being transgender, but intersected with a range of social inequities. A 2017 study featuring in-depth interviews with around 70 transgender sex workers in Maharashtra found many had experienced stigmatization, discrimination and violence.

Hotspot/ Pick-up point/Cursing & Encounter point

Hotspot/ Pick-up point/Cursing

1. Areas within a site where there is a significant concentration of HRGs are referred to as “hotspots”.
2. Within hotspots, Target Group may solicit, cruise, and interact with other Target Group members, or solicit clients for sex or purchase injecting drugs.

Encounter point

The place/point/spot where actually entertain the clients by doing sexual intercourse/injecting drugs

Registration of the Target Group (HRG) with the TI project

1. After building rapport with the Target Group, the HRG is registered by filling out the registration form (Form A).
2. A 19-digit Unique Identification number (UID) is assigned to each HRG and this enables the project to plan and track outreach and clinic services provided to him/her.
3. Registration can happen after 1- 8 contacts in the field.

Coverage & Regular Contact

Coverage

The no. of HRGs were contacted at least once during the project period.

Regular Contact

- A Target Group is receiving education regularly (once every 15 days), over a period of one year or until the Target Group is no longer in that location (total of 24 interactions a year).
- The no. of HRGs contacted on a regular basis at least twice in a month with commodity distribution services i.e. condoms, lubes, syringes and needles etc.

SEXUALLY TRANSMITTED DISEASES PREVENTION



Definitions of Sub Typology of FSW

Street based - **Street based** sex workers are those who **solicit clients** on the street or in public places such as parks, railway stations, bus stands, streets, markets, cinema halls.

Home based - **Home based** sex workers operate usually from their homes, contacting their clients on the phone or through word of mouth or through middlemen (e.g. auto drivers).

Lodge based - **Lodge based** sex workers are those who reside in what is known as a lodge (a small hotel) and their clients are contracted by the lodge owner, manager or any other employee of the lodge on the basis of sharing the profits. These sex workers do not publicly solicit for clients.

Brothel based - **Brothel based** sex workers are those whose clients contact them in recognized brothels, that is buildings or residential homes where people from outside the sex trade know that sex workers live and work.

Typically, a brothel is a place where a small group of sex workers is managed by a Madam or an agent. Usually the sex worker pays a part of her earnings to the Madam.

Definitions of Sub Typology of MSM

Double Decker - Males who both insert and receive during penetrative sexual encounters (anal or oral sex) with other men as *Double Deckers*. These days, some proportion of such persons also self-identify as *Double Deckers*.

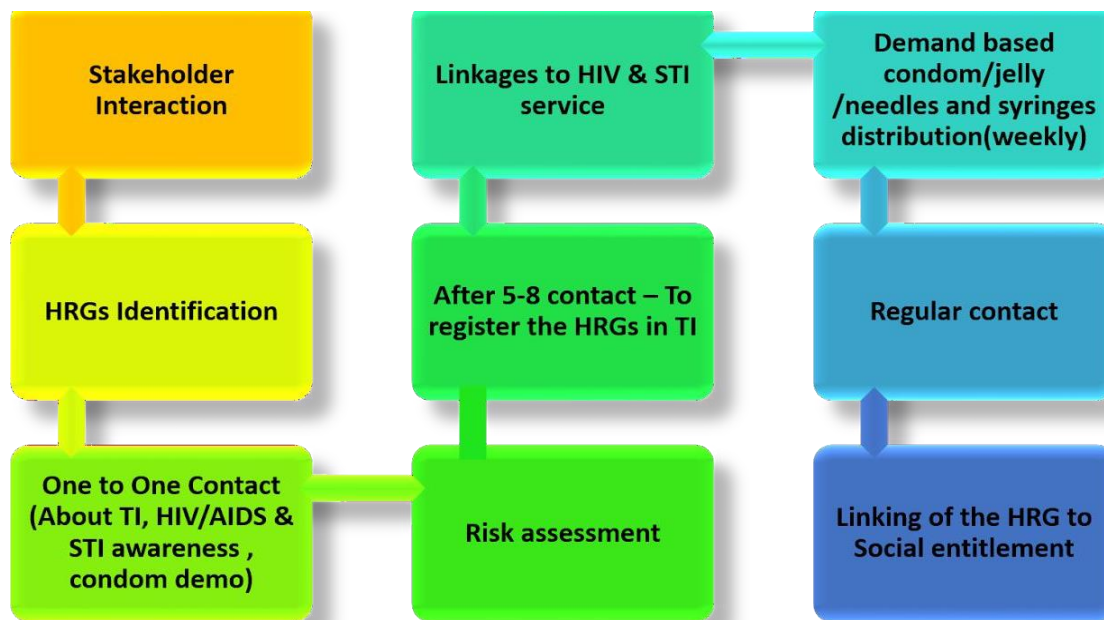
Kothi - Males who show varying degrees of “femininity” (which may be situational), take the “female” role in their sexual relationships with other men, and are involved mainly – though often not exclusively – in receptive anal/oral sex with men.

TRANSGENDER

Transgender - Distinct socio-religious and cultural group, a “third gender” (apart from male and female). They dress in feminine attire (cross-dress)

There are emasculated (castrated, *nirvan*) men, non-emasculated men (not castrated, *akva/akka*) and inter-sexed persons (hermaphrodites)

Swachhata pakhwada event was implemented with 5 themes such as Clean India (Swatch), National flag (hanga triangle), Good hygiene practiced, Covid 19 behavior and ban on single use plastic with supported by CPCL (Chennai Petroleum Corporation Limited)

Racherla GP, Andra Pradesh

The aim of this project is to maintain the villages of Moperapallai, Arundhathiwada and Racherla clean, green and hygienic, and to manage the solid waste generated in the 422 house Holds and shops, located in the Racherla Grama panchayat. The solid waste generated is collected in the designated red and green bins provided to the 324 House Holds, the collected waste is weighed, and then sorted for composting and recycling. Waste, which can be recycled, is sold to the scrap dealers, vegetable waste, fruit and yard waste is taken to the composting yard maintained by us at Racherla village.

370 sq km of the terminal is maintained by our CMV team. A total of 3 workers are engaged in D2D collection of waste on a daily basis. They also clean the public and school ground on need basis and clean

the empty plots if there is littering. The workers go for door-to-door collection. In addition to the regular activities, CMV team actively organizes sensitization and awareness campaign to the Community people and stake holders about source segregation, waste management, avoiding plastic use, water conservation, sanitation and hygiene.

6.3. Wall Painting

Lessons learnt:

I. Regular interaction with stakeholders helped the CMV team to learn the problems of the stakeholders and bring in their participation and cooperation in the project work.

II. After seeing the dedication and effort of CMV team six months, all the stakeholders have developed keen interest in the project and expressed their willingness to cooperate in future.

- We had organized 08 community meetings and around 250 Community members actively participated in it. Among them 2 were special events like “Project inauguration and awareness program” on 23rd February 2024 and “World Water Day” on 21st March-2024. These all programs had a genuine motto to promote the idea of clean nation and avoid using the plastic and bring a green environment.
- The objective of awareness activity is to reach out to a relatively large number of target population with Waste management, plantation, cleanliness, health related messages through a rally etc. These events are usually an opportunity to seek and increase the participation of stakeholders in the project.
- We inaugurated our new Project at AP. We also had the opportunity and good fortune to work in the Dumping yard of Racherla Grama panchayat, with the support of the Racherla officials and Panchayat leaders
- Our Nirmal Brigades (workers who daily Collected the garbage) are worked undoubtedly to get it from HH. The biodegradable waste collected in Racherla GP was organically composed and utilized for gardening and sapling. Our workers planted 10 trees around the Dumping yard and Racherla GP Elementary schools and watched carefully until they grow enough.
- We reached our services to 310 HH touch points
- We provided bins to the community members of 324 HH with the approval of association and ATF. The bins would provide to the community
- We had internal audit from Apollo Tyres Foundation on this year, these audits were very supportive to mold our work in a perfect way. Every month we have Telephonic review and we also have quarterly and half yearly Telephonic review to discuss about work and produce the report and get a moral and technical support to work better.

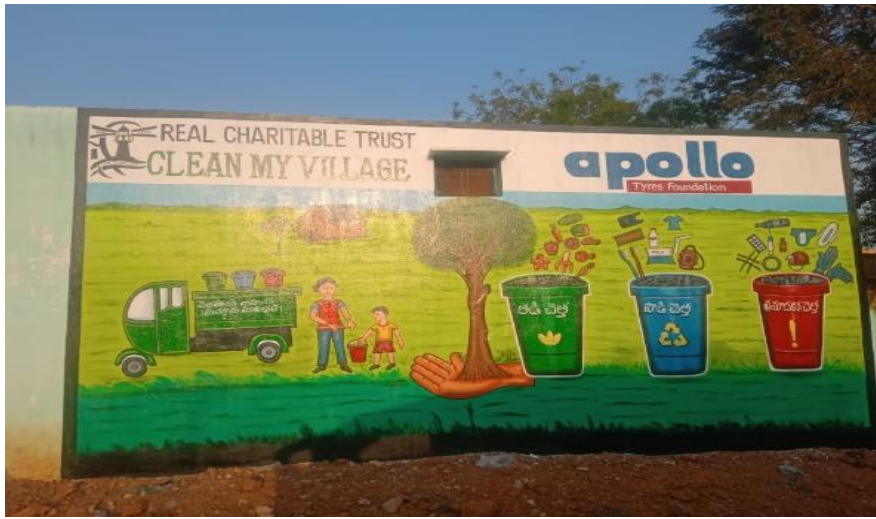
