# MESSAGE FROM SECRETARY



This gives me immense pleasure to present this 22nd Annual Report 2020-21 of SACAL. This document gives completion of our activities of the year. This year is full of challenges with continuation of COVID-19 effecting the life & livelihoods of the tribal, schedule caste & marginalized people in particular. SACAL continue to support for the victims of COVID-19 through collaborating Govt. & Non-Govt. agencies. SACAL's mission to promote millet cultivation in the tribal regions has gathered remarkable momentum both in coverage of farmers and area under cultivation.



Gradually farmers are choosing big land patches for the cultivation of millet. Every year the millet fields are increasing & gradually maize is decreasing. Maize is no more remunerative to the millets. The yield is better, selling price is better and it can with stand to the weather fluctuations. The TFPCL (Taptapani Farmers Producer Company Ltd.) is gradually better organised as an business organization. For the 1<sup>st</sup> time it has taken up marketing of millets for TDCS and marketed mangoes of the local farmers. While of the motivating factors being the increase in MSP for the produce, establishment of value added services and market is another contributing factor. The massive demonstration programmes on millet cultivation as wells as propagation for consumption through food demonstration programmes and food fairs, yielded remarkable results in food habits as well as cropping pattern. Hopefully, in the coming days we will make new strides in popularizing millet, and establish a more secured livelihood for the tribal that contributes to an improved life – physically, socially and economically.

As far as SACAL's thematic intervention on natural resource management is concerned, the year has been important. The villages which were covered under rain water management programmes have been showing the result of water and moisture conservation. The farming communities in the region are reaping the harvest of the activities. During the year SACAL witnessed immeasurable support and cooperation from the community based organizations including SHGs, VDCs and PDC in organizing events and programmes. Thanks to the capacity building measures and institution nurturing trainings imparted. These institutions function as independent village development agents under the leadership of community members. However, with the worldwide gloomy COVID-19 scenario, we have to be more cautious and alert. Given the economic condition and low level of education among the tribal communities, they become most vulnerable to the disease. There is a need of considerable awareness generation programmes to sensitize and aware the tribal communities in order to prevent them from the pandemic. Therefore, the coming days would be more stressful, but we would gracefully embrace the challenge.

# AREA OF INTERVENTION



## Sustainable Agriculture & Livelihood Promotion

SACAL believes that agriculture can only be sustainable when it is not dependent on external inputs, such as chemical fertilizers, pesticides and herbicides. It's a fact that 85% of farmers in the State are small and marginal land holders and nearly 90% of the net sown area practice rain-fed agriculture. Neither can they afford burgeoning cost of food production nor can bear crop failure incidences due to vagaries of nature or from any other results. Agriculture should depend on locally available and cost effective inputs and able to produce healthy, nutritious, geographic specific and culturally approved food. Thus, securing food production is as much important as minimizing the cost of production. SACAL endeavors to establish a risk free, cost effective and less external dependant farming culture so that the small and marginal farmers who occupy less than 2 acres of land can secure their crops. There comes the need to promote sustainable farming– a farming culture that requires less irrigation, no chemical fertilizer, no pesticides, and no herbicides and ensures a secured food production. It should be environment friendly, suitable to the local ecosystem, produces healthy, nutritious and region specific food suitable to the local climate. Under this premise, SACAL expedites organic farming culture in its operational villages through system of rice intensification and system of millet intensification. The organic culture is not limited to food grain production, but farmers are being promoted for vegetable cultivation, cultivation of pulses and backyard kitchen garden also. The local food varieties such as millets, vegetables and variety of pulses are encouraged among farmers. Restoring traditional food habits is another aspect to encourage food production. Food fairs, demonstration fairs and seed exchange fairs are regularly organised in the field locations to spread greater awareness.



## Promotion of Millets & Indigenous Crops

SACAL's intervention on millet cultivation started way back in 2008, with 1.2 acres in Halpanka village in Mohana block of Gajapati District. Under SDTT supported SRI programme. The farmer name Salman Gomango tried the millet with Bhairavi variety. He yielded 10 quintals per acre in very 1<sup>st</sup> year following the SMI method. Since then Millet & indigenous pulses and crops are being promoted extensively to secure production against the impacts of climate change and erratic rain fall. SACAL is also a facilitating agency for **“Special programme for promotion of millets in Tribal Areas of Odisha”** since 2017-18. This year a new variety of Millet named “BROWN TOP” was cultivated in 1 acre of land for the seeds cultivation purpose in Dimirijholi village of Mohan Block by the Farmer Sambaru Sabara. As a result we collected 65 KGs of seeds which was from mother panicle as per seed production guide line. 8 variety of indigenous paddy & 19 variety of millet grown in last 4 years in Mohana block. In last 5 years SACAL marvelously achieved an land mark cultivation in millet through different programmes. Through OMM programme millets cultivated in 1445 hectares with the active participation of 5284 farmers in Gajapati & Ganjam district combine.

In order to emphasis on organic sustainable farming system, SACAL organizes training programmes to the farmers on various liquid manure preparation, Vermi compost, Handi khata, Hadri, Azola pit etc. During the year SACAL trained 652 farmers on organic cultivation. Nearly 600 farmers regularly prepare & apply organic matters in their crops.



# Community Empowerment / CBO

Strengthening and capacitating village and Panchayat level institutions is at the core of every community development initiatives of SACAL. It is ensured that each initiative must be participatory, need based and people centric in nature. Unless people own, control, manage and act towards their own development, community development would be hard to establish. SACAL merely plays the role of a facilitator, while the community themselves take collective action in the struggle for their development. Therefore, organizing, collectivizing and mobilising the communities on issues affecting their basic needs, rights, entitlements and livelihoods are prioritized. Village Development Committee (VDC) and its apex Panchayat Development Committee (PDC) are key institutions take collective action at the village and Gram Panchayat level respectively. Other micro institutions such as Self Help Groups (SHG) and Farmers Clubs are there at the village level with specific interests and objectives. These institutions play key roles collectively in ensuring basic services, rights, entitlements and resources critical for community development. The further strengthening its community institution base and economic upliftment of the farmers SACAL promoted two Farmers Producer Organisation namely **Taptapani Farmers Producer Company Ltd. (TFPCL)** At- Kharidepa, GP- Chandiput, Block- Mohana, Dist- Gajapati & another one is **Dharakote Farmers Producer Company Ltd. (DFPCL)** At- Manikyapur, GP- Manikyapur, Block- Dharakote, Dist- Ganjam.

# Natural Resource Management

SACAL's field area is dominated by tribal and forest dwellers, All of the target groups are dependent on different natural resources like, land, water and forest for their livelihood. As the present society gradually shifting its dependency from all these resources due to non-remunerative or subsistence productivity and that is because of unhealthy practices of agriculture, over exploitation of forest and non judicious use of water. Hence, Protection, conservation and regeneration of all those resources are essential. Considering the above facts our organization has been continuously thriving to do regular activities on all these natural resource and the supporting activities of those.



## Rain Water Management (RWM)

**Rain Water Management** is used to mitigate extreme rainfall events without increasing the capacity of existing sewer system, and to mitigate urban heat island problems. It is well understood by now that poor management of rainwater is the major reason behind water insecurity. Therefore, improving dependability of whatever water we get to secure for all purposes appear to be our first priority. Further, in the context of providing year round livelihood activity to the majority of households, who depend upon agriculture, an increased cropping intensity substantially becomes highly relevant as the second priority. Both the priorities demand storage of adequate quantity of water out of the annual precipitation. The third priority is to improve the field condition of the small and marginal farmers.

Since our operation areas are mostly in the hilly terrains of Gajapati District. Soil and Water Conservation is most important part of our work with the farmers. People used to depend for cultivation mostly on rain water and now with improved water conservation systems in many of the villages, they are doing profitable cultivation in Winter season as well. All these water conservation systems were developed through voluntary community actions.

During the year several awareness, orientation, training and in-situ action has been initiated. The major activities were;

- Training on RWM.
- Construction of RWM structure (Primary & Secondary Bond, Surface dyke etc.)
- Training on optimal utilization of Water in summer season.
- Prevention of Soil erosion, Management of rain water & technique to increase of water level.
- During the reporting period Rain-water management structure is completed in Kaithapada village under P.Gobindpur G.P. Which was initiated during the year. The structure covered 40 acres of cultivated land of 42 families. Besides, the project created 15 acres of new land ready for cultivation in the Kharif season.

# STRATEGIC INTERVENTION



## Paul Hamlyn Foundation



Social Action for Alternative Community Learning (SACAL) partnered with Paul Hamlyn Foundation (PHF) to improve the living condition of poor and marginal farmers in Mohana block of Gajapati district. Majority of the target groups belong to ST and SC community having holdings below 2 acres of land. Though agriculture is the prime occupation of the target population, it is subsistence in nature. The present project aims to Livelihood Security through Effective Village Governance System.

A total of **2477** households of **61** villages of **3** Gram Panchayats (GP) of Mohana Block of Gajapati District in Odisha are taken for the project. The project aims to functionalize the existing PRI system through empowering the people and PRI members in 3GPs of Mohana Block of Gajapati District. Strengthening CBOs (VDC, PDC, SHGs etc) and established a collaborative relationship with PRI and Govt. line department for a sustainable development. Productivity enhancement of the vulnerable resource poor households through supporting for suitable livelihood initiatives.

### Objectives of the Project:

- Increased food and nutrition security for vulnerable households through increased productivity
- Strengthening Village Development Committee for convergence and sustainability
- Land Development, soil and Water conservation activities to ensure crop production



## Enhancing Paddy Cultivation

2234 farmers took up paddy cultivation in 3 GPs of Mohana Block, covering 2793 acres of land. The project team also organised village level meetings for orientation programme for the farmers on organic farming and its various methods. The project took sincere steps to encourage the farmers to follow various advance and improved farming technologies to increase farm productions. SRI, Line sowing, Line transplanting with organic and sustainable methods were encourage among the farmers. The project team facilitated training to the farmers on SRI & Line sowing, Vermi compost, Handi khata, Azola, Micronutrients, Seed treatment, use of weeders etc.

## Enhancing Millets/oil seeds/pulses Cultivation

The project promoted 1872 farmers undertake millets/oil seed/pulses in 1262 acres of land in 3 GPS of Mohana block. The project team organized various PDC meetings to sensitize people on seed treatment, preservation, line sowing, spacing, mixed farming, weeding & water management. Farmers understood that they require less water, no chemical fertilizers and pesticides, and take care of irregular monsoon.

## Vegetable Cultivation & Kitchen Garden

During this year the project supported **458** farmers to follow **Vegetable cultivation** in **248** acres of land in 3 GPs of Mohana block. They were supported with vegetable seeds such as; beans, lady finer, pumpkin, tomato, cucumber etc. The farmers were trained on Vegetable cultivation training including nursery raising, transplanting, treatment, organic manuring etc. Similarly, the project supported **362** families to take up **Kitchen Garden**, each of them initiated kitchen garden in 1 to 2 cent of land. This has been helped the families not only for nutrition but also got some income by selling the surplus amount of vegetables in the local market.

## Goat & Poultry Rearing

The project provided **164** Goats to **41** families for goat rearing activity in the current year. The families were selected by VDC. While initiating this activity the beneficiaries were trained on minimum livestock management including the ideal size of the shed, each beneficiary constructed the goat shed with their own contribution. The organisation ensure that the small ruminants are regularly vaccinated.

Similarly, the project provided **400** Poultry bird (Country bird) to **40** families for poultry rearing activity in the current year. These beneficiaries were selected by VDC. While initiating this activity the beneficiaries were trained on minimum livestock management including the ideal size of the shed, each beneficiary constructed the goat shed with their own contribution. The training includes Disease identification & management, Vaccination & its importance. While the poultry birds have undergone multiple cycles of egg laying over time, presently 150 hens are laying and another 80 are hatching. It estimated that each beneficiaries earn about Rs.500 to 1000 every month by selling eggs.

## Special Programme for Promotion of Millets in Tribal Areas of Gajapati & Ganjam District of Odisha

SACAL as an implementing agency for the programme “ *Special Programme for Promotion of Millets in Tribal Areas of Odisha* ” had been implementing the “*Odisha Millet Mission*” programme as an integrated approach to farmers development and meet the national agenda of not only food and nutritional security of the tribal area, but also doubling the farmers income of the small and marginal farmers of its operational area. the programme was envisaged for reviving millets in farms and in household consumptions around the tribal populated areas in addition in processing and household enterprise.

### Objectives of the Programme:

- Increasing household Consumption of Millets by about 25% to enhance household nutrition security and to create demand for millets.
- Promoting Millet Processing enterprises at Panchayat and Block level to ease processing at households and for value added markets.
- Improving Productivity of millets crop system and make them profitable.
- Developing millet Enterprises and establishing Market Linkages to rural/urban markets with focus on women entrepreneurs.
- Inclusion of Millets in State Nutrition programmes and public distribution systems.

During the year 2020-21 this programme achieved millets cultivation in 1445 hectares with the active participation of 5284 farmers in Gajapati & Ganjam district combine. This year we organized 18 numbers of trainings on different aspects like Seed Production, Community managed seed system (CMSS), Custom hiring center (CHC), Improved practices of Millets etc. with the active participation of progressive men & women farmers in both the district.

SACAL encouraged farmers on how they can increase their nutrition security by the habit of intake of millets in their daily food. We have facilitated village level awareness on various type of Millet recipes like Millet Soup, Millet Laddu, Millet Muduku, Suan Payas, Kangu Biriyan, Jana Laddu etc .to the Women members of SHGs. It had a great impact to the community and they included millet food items in their community level functions.

# Forest Right Act

SACAL has partnered with VASUNDHARA, Bhubaneswar for the implementation of community forest rights under Forest Rights Act, 2006 in Mohana block. The project titled, 'Up scaling community forest resource (CFR) rights and governance in India/ The tenure facility,' aims at facilitating the tribal communities access to their traditional and customary rights to forest that sustained their lives and livelihoods since time immemorial.

The project covers 200 villages across 22 GPs of Mohana block of Gajapati district. The project undertakes activities such as facilitation of gram sabha, claims filling, FRC formation and reformation, demarcation of customary boundaries, awareness programs, collaboration with PRI etc.

## COVID-19 Humanitarian Relief Response - SWAD (Supported by KZE & Mensen met een missie)

In the time of COVID-19 pandemic KZE & Mensen met een missie, Germany, Supported **Rs.24,000/- (Twenty four thousand only)** for Humanitarian relief for the operational area of the peace project. SACAL selected 33 poorest of the poor Households for distribution of ragi flour (as dry ration) with in the 8 villages of the projected area. SACAL also distributed 1012 nos. of Mask & 506 nos. of Soap in the operational area.

## COVID-19 Relief (Supported by ALTERNAID)

The first case of COVID-19 Pandemic was confirmed in the Indian state of Odisha on 16<sup>th</sup> March 2020. The state has confirmed 2,72,250 cases, including 21,454 active cases, 2,49,575 recoveries and 1,168 deaths as of October 2020( Reported by Health Dept. Govt. Odisha). The Govt. declared emergency and strictly followed the lockdown and shutdown norms to protect the community from transmission. The Govt. prepared a guideline for involvement of NGOs in the process to reach to the people support. Economic activities in rural areas have been hit hard with Rabi crops being completely ruined. To revive the agricultural economy, the State Government assured to increase the supply of fertilizers, seeds and other necessary agricultural inputs, and activities such as fish farming, poultry farming, horticulture, and dairy farming was encouraged. The Educational institutions are completely closed till date. Govt. made elaborate arrangements for nearly 79,000 migrant labors for their safe journey to Odisha in this pandemic.



### COVID-19 Response

SACAL team members have extensively worked during COVID 19 emergency situation. All the staff members were provided with movement pass on 15<sup>th</sup> April by the Administration of Mohana Block. They reached the operational villages carefully when people were in fear and stress due to lock-down and shutdown. The staff members voluntarily contributed and created a small fund for COVID-19 response and started humanitarian support along with creating awareness on hand washing, using mask and social distancing. Around 5000 anti-dust masks were been stitched locally by a rural widow tailor named **Pratima Bira** of Chandiput and marketed during the shutdown period. We covered around 27 Gram Panchayats, distributed vegetable & millets seeds, and encouraged the farmers restore agriculture activities in their own land without any panic. We ensured that the Govt. programmes like distribution of rice & dal, seeds, plantation activities must reach to the farmers.



## ALTERNAID supported COVID-19 relief

In the mean time of pandemic ALTERNAID, Germany supported by **Rs. 3,54,102/-** for quick relief. SACAL has targeted to the most vulnerable like pregnant mothers, physically challenged and single headed persons. It has collected the information's from the secondary sources like from Anganwadi workers, Asha workers and Gram Panchayat. All the information gathered were triangulated in Gram Panchayats and village level meetings were organized accordingly to confirm the beneficiaries list along with the village development committee. After due verification the final list prepared and approved by respective Sarapanch. The details of our plan shared with the BDO and invited to inaugurate the programme. On 18th August 2020 the first distribution camp was inaugurated by the BDO, Sri Bansidhar Khosla and participated by the Sarapanch, Karchabadi Panchayat Development committee & VDC members and all the beneficiaries of the Panchayat observing the COVID-19 norms during the distribution. Similarly in other 3 Panchayats distribution was organized through local Sarapanch and other VDC members.

**Relief Material:** Jaggery, Ragi flour, Soya bean, Green gram, Dal, Flatten rice, Chattua, Biscuit, Soap & Anti dust Mask.
